


Question 1.

Players called the TD in board 2 after the cards were counted: 14-13-13-13. The TD found a surplus card, removed it, and the players started bidding. Then the TD started looking for where the missing card came from. After a short investigation, it turned out to be a card from board 1. The TD reviewed a video recording and, indeed, the previous board had been played 13-13-12, declarer played the board with 12 cards.

According to Law 14, there may have been revokes. Which Law does apply? A. 64A B. 64C

The TD polled players with North's hand. Half of them bid 3♣ and half passed.

He also inspected all results in the board (on the right).




South plays 3NT and took 8 tricks.

How many tricks will declarer take?

South is declarer in no trump contract, East on lead.


East plays ♥Q (West revokes) and ♥2 to declarer's ♥9 (West revokes again).

Declarer takes ♥J and loses two diamonds. TD!

3♠ – not alerted on any side of the screen. However, West was asked about the meaning and explained: "Not agreed, either own suit or pass/correct". East didn't alert because they didn't discuss this sequence.

After a spade lead, declarer took 1 trick, -800.

North called the TD because 3♠ was not alerted and he assumed it was natural, otherwise, he would have bid 4 ♦.

What is your ruling?


West led ♠7 to the Ace. A spade ruffed and ◆10 ducked by both defenders. In the next diamond trick ◆K met ◆A. West was squeezed in majors and the contract was made.

East called the TD and explained that he ducked the first diamond trick to see a signal from his partner. He knew from bidding that South had ◆K. The TD established that, according to the system, 5 ◆ shows 1 or 4 key cards.

What is your ruling?

- A. Score stands. No misinformation.
- B. Score stands. There was misinformation, but a bad result was a consequence of the poor play.

NS called the TD and complained about reaching the slam after the slow 3NT.

East explained that with this hand, in teams, a suit contract is always better than 3NT.



Question 8.




Teams, North plays 4♠ after uncontested bidding.

He takes ◆Q lead with the Ace and plays ♠10 to the Queen. A diamond switch was taken by the King and the play of a small spade to the Jack revealed the trump's position.

Declarer played a small club and finessed with \$7.

The ending:




Now he plays ♣A and when both defenders follow, plays ♣K and claims: "You take only two trump tricks – the Ace and a ruff".

East objects, because he doesn't have to ruff. TD!

How many tricks will declarer take?

Question 9.



South plays 4♠ and already took 6 tricks.

As the play was slow and in the auction NS agreed both major suits, declarer is convinced he plays a heart contract. Also defenders seem to be tired...

In 5-card ending (on the left) declarer plays ◆QJ10 and "discards" spades from hand. Now he plays ♦8 and, when East plays ♥9, claims: "I take two trumps, 11 tricks".

At that moment everyone realizes what happened and calls the TD.

How many tricks will the TD give to declarer? B. 10 tricks





Lead \$5. Declarer asked for \$J, but dummy played \$2. It was not noticed by players. West took the trick with the Queen and the play continued.

VJ to VQ, VA, a spade to the Ace, a club ruffed and a heart to the King. West played VQ. Declarer took it with the Ace and played AK covered with the Ace and ruffed.

In the ending:




Declarer entered dummy with **A**K to played **A**J. Now West called the TD, because **A**J had been already played in the first trick.

What's your ruling?

- A. 8 tricks, &J was played in trick 1.
- B. 9 tricks, ♣J was not played in trick 1.

North explains he needed to plan his bidding and draws attention to the fact that also East thought before passing.


South took 6 tricks.

What is your ruling?

- A. Score stands. East draws conclusions from North's pass at his own risk.
- B. 1NT by S, 7 or 8 tricks. The spade lead was suggested by East's hesitation before his pass.
- C. Weighted score based on part scores in majors for EW. East was illegally misled by North.

When East bid 7♦, South started thinking. No longer than 3-4 seconds later North made a comment: "Go ahead, whatever you do, I bid 7♠".

The TD was called and after collecting facts, asked to continue the play. South doubled and North bid $7 \spadesuit$, as he had said. The slam was won, but $7 \spadesuit x$ was a good sacrifice.

If the TD decides to poll players, he will learn that South has an automatic pass over 7 ♦ showing 1st class control and after a forcing pass North bids 7 ♠, no logical alternative. However, after 7 ♦ doubled, four out of six players passed with North's hand.


12.1. What is your ruling?

Question 13.



South plays 3NT and has already taken 7 tricks. Declarer knows the distribution of the remaining cards.

In the ending (on the left) declarer plays a diamond from dummy and claims: "After two diamond tricks you're end-played". East-West agreed the 3NT was made. The score was entered to a bridgemate.

Sometime later West asks: "What would happen if my partner ducks a diamond?"

What will the TD rule if EW finds the winning defense...

13.1. ... before they starts bidding in the next board at the same table?


13.2. ...two rounds later before the end of the tournament?

After the play, North-Souths called the TD because they didn't like their opponents reaching the grand slam after a hesitation.




... in the ending:



East plays ♥10, South ♥8 and West starts thinking. After a few seconds, South shows his hand and says: "I have all high trumps, 11 tricks."

East calls the TD and says that after such a claim, declarer loses: ♥10-♥8-♣5-♣10, a spade ruffed high, a diamond ruffed high, and again a spade and a diamond ruffed high promotes a trump trick...

... as shown below:




