

# 2004 EUROPEAN YOUTH TEAM CHAMPIONSHIPS

PRAGUE, CZECH REPUBLIC • 1-11 AUGUST

# comprising:

- 19th European Junior Team Championship
- 6<sup>th</sup> European Schools Team Championship
- 1st European Girls Team Championship

Open to all member countries of the EBL. Each country may be represented by one national team in each series, consisting of 4-6 players.

At the age of 36, European Youth Bridge returns to the place of its birth - **Prague**, the capital of the Czech Republic. Indeed, it was in 1968 that the first *European Junior Championship*, for players up to 25 years, took place in the capital of what was then Czechoslovakia, attracting representatives of 10 nations.

Since then, a lot has changed. The **Junior** Championship, held uninterruptedly every two years, is now an established event of the international calendar, attended by most European countries. In 1994, the **Schools** series was added, for players up to 20 years; it has been going from strength to strength ever since. Now, the EBL has the ambition to see a new event taking off: the **Girls** series, reserved for female Juniors. The inaugural tournament is to take place this year in Prague - 36 years later...

**EUROPEAN BRIDGE LEAGUE • CZECH BRIDGE FEDERATION** 



The CZECH REPUBLIC (pop. 10m), comprising the historic regions of Bohemia, Moravia and part of Silesia, borders Poland to the north, Germany to the northwest and west, Austria to the south, and Slovakia to the east.

The Czech-inhabited lands of Bohemia and Moravia were part of the Austro-Hungarian Empire from the early 17th century until 1918, when they were united in a common state with Slovakia and part of Silesia. The new state, known as Czechoslovakia, was broken up during World War II, but was reestablished in 1945. During the early 1990s, the Czechs and Slovaks decided to dissolve the republic, and two independent states were born in 1993: the Czech Republic and Slovakia.

PRAGUE (pop 1.1m), capital and largest city of the Czech Republic, is located in the central part of the country, in the region of Bohemia. Often called the 'City of a Hundred Spires' because of its many churches and towers, Prague is a main commercial, industrial, and cultural center. It is also one of the most beautiful cities in Europe, and a major tourist attraction.

Greater Prague was formed in 1920 by the incorporation of 37 nearby towns and villages, but today it also includes numerous new suburban developments. The historic center of the city developed in a broad valley on the banks and surrounding hills of the Vltava River. Many bridges link the two parts of the city. The most famous of these is Charles Bridge.

#### Venue

The Championship will be played in the **National House of Smichov**, the town hall of one of Prague's districts.

# **Accommodation**

There is a great variety of accommodation possibilities in Prague.

For the participants, a number of solutions has been worked out by the organizers; they include:

- 3-star hotels within a walking distance from the venue at €45
- 2-star hotels at €0 (with convenient public transportation)
- student accommodation at €20 (transportation provided)

All above rates are per person, per night in a double room. Single and 3-bedded rooms are available upon request.

The quoted rates are on a full-board basis. Breakfast will be provided at the hotel, while lunch and dinner will be served at the venue.

Detailed information on accommodation will be provided by the local organizers who will also prescribe the procedure for room reservations.

All players must be females born on or after **1 January 1979**. Participation is by invitation only. There is no entry fee for the inaugural event.

• Trophies and souvenir gifts (7 per team) to the winners and a number of top teams, depending on the entries.

The Girls series will be held if at least four countries take part.

# **Special Regulations**

#### Systems

The Championships are classified in Category 3 of the EBL Systems Policy, Accordingly, all systems of bidding and card play may be used, with the exception of Highly Artificial Systems and Brown Sticker Conventions.

#### Convention Cards

Each pair must complete an official Convention Card and lodge it with the Appeals Committee before 15 July 2004.

#### Screens

Table screens will be used in all series throughout.

#### Dress Code

Teams are expected to be dressed appropriately during play, and especially at the ceremonies where uniform outfit is strongly encouraged.

#### Not allowed

Smoking and alcohol drinking, as well as the use of mobile phones, pagers and any kind of electronic communication devices in the playing area are strictly prohibited.
